From the Chairman

The following statement on the Russian invasion of Ukraine was endorsed by the Town Council at its meeting on 14 March: Corsham Town Council supports the people of Ukraine and strongly condemns the attacks and violations of the territorial integrity and sovereignty of Ukraine. We express our full support and solidarity

to the Ukrainian people and to our peers in local government in Ukraine.

Whilst it is easy to make expressions of support, it is hugely difficult to know how best to respond, either as a Council or as individuals, to the awful plight of the Ukrainian people. We suggest checking Wiltshire Council's website (wiltshire.gov.uk/support-forukraine) if you are considering making a donation and the Town Council will continue to look for ways in which we might be able to provide meaningful help.

The work of the Town Council pales into insignificance in comparison to the situation in Ukraine, but I'd like to draw attention to two of our projects. In our budget for next year (see page 3) we have included enough money to allow the two-hours' free parking to continue. We have had very positive feedback from town centre businesses

and residents on the value and impact of the scheme. Keeping the town centre alive and vibrant is a major priority and we urge residents to keep up the 'shop local' habit. We had very positive feedback from residents, too, on our proposals for improvements on Newlands Road and are taking steps to move to more detailed designs (see below).

We have also increased the budget for Health and Wellbeing, allowing us to support and fund initiatives in the town, such as:

Activities for Young People – Corsham Youth Zone (CYZ) has been struggling to find volunteers to support the Friday night youth club sessions it runs at the Springfield Campus. We have recently agreed to support CYZ with a grant of £8,200 so that they can employ youth workers to run the sessions. We are also providing £7,000 to The Rise Trust charity to employ two

trained outreach youth workers for two evenings a week (in a 12-month pilot scheme) to engage with young people. In the longer term, we would like to see a much greater availability of out-of-school activities.

Families with Children Under 5 – The Rise Trust currently runs weekly 'Chat and Chill' toddler sessions at Springfield. We are providing £1,400 to the Trust to enable these Tuesday sessions to double in length for the next year.

I sincerely hope the war in Ukraine will be over by the time of our next newsletter but, in the meantime, I know that our caring Corsham community will find ways of supporting the Ukrainian people in this heartbreaking time of trouble.

Jubilee Jamboree

This summer sees the official celebrations for Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

As a Town Council we want to mark this historic occasion by creating a legacy which will benefit future generations, so all our tree planting has been included as part of The Queen's Green Canopy (queensgreencanopy.org).

We also want a celebration for the community, so this year's Summer Fete (see p1) will be in honour of the Jubilee. And we want some fun, so we will be hosting a very special digital story-trail - from 30 April until 12 June - around the town where Sir Barnaby Beacon will introduce you to his friends and guide you through the history of the Queen's reign (jubileebeacontrail.com).

Public Realm Consultation

Corsham Town Council has been working with urban designers from Atkins to develop plans to improve the public realm in the Newlands Road area.

The aim is to improve the visual amenity of the area, improve pedestrian routes from residential areas to the town centre and to rebalance provision for road users, making it easier for pedestrians and cyclists. In December 2021, the

Town Council undertook some consultation on Atkins' initial plans. The overall response from residents was very positive with 72 of 79 respondents in favour of improving the area. We also received useful comments and suggestions which will help inform the plans as they develop so thank you to everyone who took part. More detailed designs will be produced, with more consultation to follow.

Strategic Plan Update

Thank you to everyone who let us know what they think the Town Council's priorities should be in our new Strategic Plan for 2022-26.

From a list of eight priorities, the top five were Environment/Climate Change, Transport and Highways, Community Facilities, Health and Wellbeing and Physical/Historic/Public Realm. The other themes – Support for Businesses, Arts and Culture and Tourism and Events – were also well supported and will play a part in the Plan. Overall, our aim is to keep delivering the work we already do, while continually improving the town for the good of residents, visitors, businesses and the environment. Council Tax 2022/23

For 2022/23, the overall increase in the Town Council's element of the Council Tax bill is 4.83%. The increase is from £210.05 to £220.30 for a Band D equivalent property for the year.

This increase equates to just under 20p per week. The Town Council's overall budget for 2022/23 will be £1,228,776 and the precept will be £1,093,192.

Notable projects and service developments the Town Council is planning to start or continue in the coming year include:

An allowance of £40,000 has been included for income from the Community Infrastructure Levy. There are existing earmarked reserves for several projects. The most significant of these are: Service Delegation and Asset Transfer, and Community Infrastructure Levy, some of which is allocated to Public Realm Improvements in the town centre.

The Town Council always gives careful consideration to setting the budget and has to strike a balance between providing the services and facilities that local people want and the impact that increasing the budget can have on residents.



Play Area Consultations

Corsham Town Council is taking on five play areas from Wiltshire Council, initially under a seven-year agreement.

The play areas are Bences Lane, Katherine Park - the large play area including the surrounding open space, Katherine Park - small play area, and both play areas off Pockeridge Road. The Town Council plans to improve maintenance straight away with more significant improvements to follow, in consultation with residents. We hope to take over management of the play areas at the beginning of April.

Environment Update

Face Masks and Lateral Flow **Test Recycling**

We are working with specialist company ReFactory - who create new products from single-use plastics - to help residents recycle Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and lateral flow tests. There is now a recycling bin in the main entrance at Springfield Community Campus (not at the Recycling Hub) where you can drop off lateral flow tests (in the plastic/foil bag they come in), disposable face masks, plastic gloves, and visors/face screens. This scheme reduces the amount of PPE that is taken to landfill or ends up littering our natural environment.

High Street Recycling Bins

We have been really pleased to see the volume of recycling being collected in our new High Street bins. This has drastically reduced the amount of public waste that Corsham was previously generating and sending to landfill. We would, however, like to remind all residents that these bins cannot take glass; glass is only recycled through household recycling collections.



Due to the success of this pilot project, we will be installing more public recycling bins around Corsham.

Corsham Community Garden

'Environmental group Corsham Climate Action (CCA), in partnership with The Pound Arts Trust, is creating a community garden in the old playground area behind The Pound,' writes CCA Chair Adam Walton. 'We received funding from Corsham Area Board, Corsham Town Council and Corsham Co-op for this project, and have prepared a design for the garden and started to clear the site. in preparation for hard landscaping work and the planting of trees and shrubs.

'Community gardens offer great benefits in terms of well-being and environmental awareness. We intend to work with local groups to enable the garden to be accessible to a broad range of people across our community who can work in the garden, learn about gardening and nature, and enjoy another green open space in the town.

'We have a small team of volunteers working on the garden. If you would like to help, please contact corshamclimateaction@gmail.com.'
