From the Chairman

Looking to the future

– and some reflection

The elections for the Town Council have been and gone with no voting taking place because we only had 13 candidates for 20 positions. We have been active since then in looking for people to join the Council by co-option and hope to have all 20 spaces filled soon.

Nevertheless, the process of renewing the membership of the Council for the next four years provides a moment to reflect on what we want to achieve. We will be working up a new Strategic Plan, to 2026, to follow the one that we have been working to where our achievements include:

- Getting our Neighbourhood Plan up and running
- Growing our budget and capacity for improving the health and wellbeing of people in our community
- Prioritising the urgent issue of tackling climate change

On the last point, I believe we need to look far ahead and

imagine how life might be in 2040 - only 10 years short of the target date set by the Government for achieving net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050. I suspect that the most obvious and significant changes for all of us will be to our transport systems and how we get around, and secondly to how we heat our homes. On the first point, we are due a transport plan from Wiltshire Council to guide our thinking in improving the ways in which people move around the town as safely and sustainably as possible, noting that petrol and diesel cars will be phased out in 2030. The heating of homes without fossil fuels is an area on which the government is still working as it looks at developing realistic and affordable solutions. Separately, the Town Council is working closely with Wiltshire Council on deciding what level

of housing and commercial development should be planned for in our community for the period to 2036. Any new developments will also need to imagine 2040 and beyond.

In closing, I would like to pay tribute to all the staff of the Town Council for keeping our services on track as much as circumstances allowed, whilst also going the extra mile to contribute to the work of supporting people in our community during the pandemic. I am a stubborn optimist and believe that, with the help of the staff team and the new team of Councillors, we will be able to take gradual steps over the next four years towards the long-term goal of a sustainable and thriving community.



Health and Wellbeing

As we start to move out of the pandemic, the Town Council is looking at how it can best support the health and wellbeing of all its residents. A Health and Wellbeing Group has been formed, and Vickie Fauset (vfauset@corsham.gov.uk), the Town Council's new Health and Wellbeing Officer, is currently working with the Group to find out as much as possible about the services and support available and where any gaps might be. The initial focus, given the impact Covid has had across the community, will be on mental health issues, particularly among young people. The work will then move on to help families and older/vulnerable people. Early plans include funding projects in schools; continuing the Town Council's support for Corsham Youth Zone and Hub Club; working with The Pound and Wiltshire Council's Area Board Local Youth Network to survey 11-18 year olds to find out what activities would help them, and sharing information across the community.

Grants – How We Can Help

Did you know that the Town Council has its own grants scheme? Up to a maximum of £500 is available to local groups and organisations working to improve activities and services for the benefit of Corsham residents.

Two recipients of Town Council grants have been the Walking Festival and Corsham Bowls Club. The team behind the Walking Festival held yet another wonderful weekend in June – and a huge thank you to them for all their hard work – with 279 people taking part in guided walks, and 35 families enjoying the Saturday Treasure Hunt.

Work on Corsham Bowls Club's new green started in the summer of 2019 and, after over a year of work and a pandemic in between, the 'New Green Official Opening Day' finally took place last month. The Club members have worked tirelessly to raise funds from various sources, including Sport England, Wiltshire Council and the Town Council, and did much of the work themselves. They have done a fantastic job and we are delighted to have been able to help.

The closing date for the next round of our grant applications is 11 August, but grants are considered by the Town Council's Finance and Administration Committee every two months so there are plenty of opportunities through the year. Spring Flowers for Springfield

The Town Council's commitment to supporting local artists and public art is continuing with the new gateway for the Valley Road entrance at Springfield Rec, created by Anya Beaumont.

Taking inspiration from the Rec's wildflower area, the two floral pieces, which are almost three metres tall, have been created using second-hand fence panels and gates which have been welded together.

Eventually the gateway will be joined by a smaller barrier, of a similar design, to prevent children and dogs running straight out towards the road, along with fence panels which Anya is working on now.
