# HM Queen Elizabeth II 1926-2022



At 6,30pm, on 8 September 2022, the world was forever altered with eight words from Buckingham Palace: "The Queen died peacefully at Balmoral this afternoon."

Here in Corsham we joined the rest of the country, the Commonwealth and the globe in mourning her loss. To mark Her Majesty's passing, the Union Jack was immediately flown with a 'mourning cravat'. (The flagpole at the Town Hall is at an angle, meaning the flag cannot be flown at half-mast, hence the cravat.) The Town Council's Chairman, Clir Steve Abbott, released a statement. A Book of Condolence was available at the Town Hall - the Town Council's Chairman and Vice-Chairman also took a Book of Condolence to local care homes for residents to sign - and the War Memorial was designated as the site for floral tributes. The day after the State Funeral the flowers were collected in a simple ceremony to be composted and used on a future planting scheme, or tree, dedicated to The Queen.

#### The Proclamation of King Charles III

As happened in hundreds of other places across the country, the Proclamation of King Charles III was read in the town, taking place in front of the Town Half on Sunday 11 September at 1.15pm. This

historic occasion was led by the Chairman in front of a small crowd of invited dignitaries, including Stephanie Millward MBE, Deputy Lieutenant for Wiltshire, and local residents.

#### Chairman's Statement

At the tender age of 21, the then Princess Elizabeth promised the nation that her whole life, 'whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service'.

All of us at Corsham Town Council are incredibly grateful that, as Queen Elizabeth II for over 70 years, she carried out her promise diligently and tirelessly.

She was the only monarch most of us have ever known, a steady presence throughout incredible changes.

In times when nothing stood But worsened, or grew strange, There was one constant good; She did not change.\*

We remember her with great respect and affection, and we give thanks for Her Majesty's service, sense of duty and absolute dedication to the people of our country and the Commonwealth.

While we mourn the passing of our Queen, our thoughts are very much with His Majesty The King and the rest of the Royal Family who have lost a mother, a grandmother and a great grandmother. We send our deepest condolences to them as they face the challenges of the next few difficult days and weeks.



Whereas it has pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth the Second of blessed and glorious memory, by whose Doccaso the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland is solely. and rightfully come to The Prince Charles Philip Arthur George: We, therefore, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of this Realm and Members of the House of Commons, together with other members of Her Late Majesty's Privy Council and Representatives of the Realms and Territorics, Aldermon and Citizens of Lendon, and others, do now hereby with one voice and Consent of Tongue and heart publish and proclaim that The Prince Charles Philip Arthur George is now, by the Death of our late Sovereign of Happy Memory, become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord Charles the Third, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of His other Realms and Territories, King, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith, to whom we do acknowledge all Faith and Obedienco with humble Affection; beseeching God by whom Kings and Queens do reign to bloss His Majosty with long and happy Years to reign over us. Given at St James's Palace this Tenth day of September in the Year of Our Lord Two thousand and twenty-two.

PLUS Watch out for the fairy doorways appearing around the town centre – and their fairies courtesy of Corsham Knitting and Crochet Club!




#### We Will Remember Them

Acts of Remembrance will seem even more polgnant this year following the death of The Queen. On Friday 11 November, at 11am, members of the Royal British Legion will lead a two-minute silence in the Martingate Centre.

Then, on Sunday 13 November, Corsham will come together to remember the town's fallen, and all those who have lost their lives in conflict. There will be a service at St Bartholomew's at 10am, after which the parade will form up outside the church and march along the High Street and Lacock Road to the War Memorial.

The service there will begin at approximately 10.50am and will include the two-minute silence at 11 o'clock, followed by the laying of wreaths. (Please note that there will be road closures in place and possible delays around town from approximately 10.30-11.45am.)

Paul Garcia, from the Souper Friday team writes: Souper Friday runs at the Baptist Church in Priory Street. Started prior to lockdown, this was originally a project to provide a café serving a free hot drink, soup and a roll, as well as a place to meet people and find a listening ear. During lockdown, the concept was expanded to include practical help to families and singles finding it hard to make ends meet by delivering to those people surplus supermarket groceries, fresh fruit and vegetables, plus frozen meals, all for free,

This project continued after lockdown, though people are

now encouraged to come to collect food at our 'market' and stay on for the drink and soup in the café, which is a great place to forge friendships. We still make no charge for anything.

#### Corsham Station Update

A widely promoted online survey about the station was carried out from 15 July to 5 August resulting in 1,511 responses. Thank you to all who took part.

The key findings were that 39.58% of respondents would use the station more than once per week, with 41.23% using it once per week or less, but over 12 times per year; the most frequent journeys would be leisure trips (41.89%) followed: by commuting (33.55%) and by far the most popular places to travel to/from Corsham Station were Bristol or Bath at 65.59%, with Reading, London and South East England in second

place at 17.27%. Only 1.26% of participants said they would be unlikely to use Corsham. Station.

The information from the survey will be used as part of the Strategic Outline Business Case, which is due to be submitted to the Department for Transport later this year. If the project passes this stage, then things such as design, planning, access and operational feasibility will be looked at in more detail.
